Message from the Rav

Attaining Closeness with Hashem

The end of this week's Parsha (and much of next week's Parsha) has numerous Pesukim that end with words "Ani Hashem," or "Ani Hashem Elokeichem," much more than usual.

The story is told of an Israeli Kiruv Rabbi, fluent in both Hebrew and English, who delivered a speech to a crowd of Baalei Teshuva in New York. He spoke passionately about our purpose in life and creating a relationship with Hashem. After the speech, one attendee praised his ability to translate everything he said into perfect English. "However, there was one word you kept on forgetting to translate: 'Hashem.' What does that mean?!"

Unlike the story above, the following story wasn't just told; it actually happened. **R' Yisroel Belsky** and his Bais Din were Megayeir (converted) a young woman who then married and settled in the Philippines. When their daughter was to be Bas Mitzva, **R'** Belsky and his wife made plans to join them in the Philippines for the occasion. A week before the event, the Belsky's daughter had quadruplets, three boys and a girl, and the next day their daughter-in-law had a boy. **R'** Belsky could have served as Mohel for four grandsons in the span of two days; however, they had already committed to join the Bas Mitzva, and they chose to honor that commitment and missed all the Brisos. Years later, **R'** Belsky's daughter commented that perhaps her father was granted four more years of life after suffering a life-threatening esophagus rupture because he gave up four Brisos for the sake of gladdening a Ger Tzedek.

Our job in this world is to do things because Hashem wants us to, and through that to build a relationship with Him. When we desire to do what is right, we hopefully merit Hashem's help to make the right choices. The key is the desire and the yearning, and the willingness to do whatever is necessary to be able to forge that relationship.

The Parsha this week discusses the Kohen Gadol's yearly entry to the Kodesh Kadashim (Holy of Holies) to perform in solitude the holiest service of the year. The **Meshech Chachma** notes how we find many times in the Neviim that the nation gathered in Yerushalyim on Yom Tov when they came to be Oleh Regel. But we never find in the Navi that they gathered in the Bais Hamikdash on Yom Kippur. However, in Chazal and in our Tefillos we see that they did come in large numbers to observe the Kohen Gadol's Avoda on Yom Kippur. The Meshech Chachma explains that the Naviim were during the first Bais Hamikdash, while the Chazal are referring to the second one. Why did they come on Yom Kippur only during the later period?

He explains that the Shalosh Regalim are times when we are supposed to join the Klal in the Bais Hamikdash. (cont. —>)

(--> cont.) Everyone has a Mitzva to be Oleh Regel and bring Karbanos. But Yom Kippur was not like that; it was mostly the personal Avoda of the Kohen Gadol. No one else was involved; rather they stayed put and focused on their own Avoda of fasting and Teshuva. So why was it different during the second Bais Hamikdash? Says the Meshech Chachma, the Kohen Gadol was on a high spiritual level during the Avoda of Yom Kippur. He entered the holiest place on earth, a place that even Malachim could not go, and even merited a level of Nevuah (prophecy). During the first Bais Hamikdash, Nevuah was more common as many people attained that level, so in and of itself wasn't a reason for anyone to come and observe the Kohen Gadol on Yom Kippur. However, soon after the second Bais Hamikdash was built, Nevuah stopped, and from then on, the only ability we had to connect to at least some level of Nevuah was to observe the Kohen Gadol on Yom Kippur. So throngs of Yidden who yearned for a connection to Hashem gathered each year to try and connect with the Kohen Gadol when he'd reach that level of Nevuah.

Rabbi Binyomin Stoll a few years ago in Ohr HaTzafone vividly described the awesomeness of the Kohen Gadol's entry into



the Kodesh Hakadashim, and then cited the **Nefesh Hachaim** who says that in fact, every Yid experiences this every moment of their lives. Our bodies are a microcosm of the Bais Hamikdash, with the heart representing the Kodesh Hakadashim, and our thoughts and emotions are the service being performed there. If our

thoughts are proper and directed to Hashem, we are like the Kohen Gadol on Yom Kippur performing the holiest service.

If the only remnant of Nevuah in the second Bais Hamikdash was in the Kodesh Hakadashim on Yom Kippur, today it's in the Batei Medrashos and Batei Kenesios, as Chazal teach

that Eyn Lo L'Hakadosh Boruch Hu Ela Daled Amos Shel Halacha Bilvad. As we discussed this Yom Tov prior to Yizkor, we need to realize what we have. We have a Shul that is not just a place to daven, but it is the beacon of light for all Devorim Sheb'kedusha in the entire Kehilla. Bais Yisroel is able to have that Hashpa'ah (influence) because we are a Ke-
